



Grading Change 2022-23

Retakes

- Students may retake any summative assessment one time for a grade up to, but no more than 85. Retakes must happen in the 9 weeks grading period (academic quarter) in which the assignment was originally assigned and should be completed within a reasonable amount of time.
- Students must complete all missing homework and formative assignments that led up to the summative to be eligible for a retake. Students that have missing formative work or homework will not be eligible to request and complete a redo/retake for a summative assessment.
- IF a student has completed all formative and summative assignments leading up to the summative, and has asked for a retake, teachers may, within reason, provide an extension lesson (think Khan academy lesson) or assignment before providing the re-take.

10th Graders (STEM + IBDP Pathways) IB Middle Years Programme (IBMYP)

Programme emphasizes critical and creative thinking, expands opportunities to explore meaningful global contexts, centers teaching on the student and holistic approaches to learning and uses highly innovative assessments.



- All 10th graders across all subjects at Hillsboro
- Aligns to courses offered in the IBDP and IBCP
- Precursor to the rigor of IBCP, IBDP, and STEM
- Culminates in a 25-hour Personal Project based in the sophomore English class
 - Personal Project centers on a self-selected interest/passion
 - Promotes inquiry, discovery, and reflection
 - Prepares students for the types of research/writing in the IBDP and IBCP

- Cultivate language skills through a Language
 Development portfolio (50 hours)
- Research and analyze an ethical issue in their potential future industry through a Reflective Project (3,000 research essay or project)
- Job shadow and develop career portfolios that prepare them for college and future careers

Students need a green hall pass every time they leave class.

A new hall pass system is in the works, but for now, please use the green hall pass system.

If an adult asks where you are going, please show them the hall pass. It must have a time and location or you will asked to return to class.



HHS Student Expectations



Outside Food Deliveries/Selling Snacks:

Food must be delivered in person to the main office by parent/guardian. No delivery services allowed. Food will be confiscated.

Dress Code:

- -Shorts/Skirts fingertip length with dropped shoulders
- -No visible undergarments
- -No tube tops, crop tops
- -No inappropriate images (offensive, illegal, etc.)
- -Tears in clothing above fingertip length -Shoes must be worn at all times

Tardies (Repeat)

Teacher will mark tardies for in-person students in IC.

Tardies will count on a **<u>PER DAY</u>** basis.

Cell Phones (Repeated noncompliance)

Teacher gives 2 warnings to place phones/headphones away. After 3rd warning: Teacher writes a referral (**203: Electronic Devices**)

Skipping Class

Students are considered skipping if:

Present in the building but not in assigned class (including when a teacher is absent). This includes going to another area of the building during an assigned class (IE: Library, Another Teacher's class, etc.)

Leaves the building without parental permission and/or signing out with attendance clerk (This behavior would result in a 302: Leaving School Grounds).

HHS Student Expectations

Repeat Profanity (not directed at teacher)

1st 2 times in class period: Warning

After 3rd time in class period: Student will be removed from class. Referral code 204: Disruption of Classroom.

Profanity directed at a teacher or staff

OSS, Restorative Conference upon return

If repeated, student will be placed on a behavior contract and an informal hearing will take place.

Disruption of Classroom, Inappropriate Physical Contact with Other Students (not fighting, not contact sexual in nature)

1st 2 times in class period: Warning

After 3rd time in class period: Call for campus supervisor to escort student to academy dean. Submit referral using code 204: Disruption of Classroom.

<u>Activities prohibited on campus:</u> Gambling

Possession of and/or use of Tobacco Products

Drug Paraphernalia and/or use of illegal drugs

Possession of over the counter medication (This must be registered with the school nurse and have parent permission.)

Leaving school grounds without parent permission

Fighting and/or Group Fights

Threats

Inappropriate use of Electronic Devices

Inappropriate Sexual Behavior

Indecent Exposure

Offensive Touching

Bullying and/or Harassment
